- 1. What was your greatest success this semester? Why?
 - a. My greatest success this semester would have to be my professional growth in the quality of my forms. My forms are much more refined and clean than previous classes. I have also developed my skill on both hand building and wheel work. My progress can be seen in the smoothness of the fired clay, the symmetry of the forms, and the thin walls of the wheel work.
